












Dear CRJW Friends,

Not often does a 20-year-old nonprofit organization have the opportunity to create new tools to accomplish its mission. But that is precisely what the Center For Restorative Justice Works (CRJW) has been doing during the Covid-19 pandemic. Many of you know the extreme challenges that incarcerated people, their children and families face: high rates of Covid transmission in prisons; cancellation of in-person visits for more than a year; difficulty in communicating with incarcerated loved ones; not knowing about the health and safety of loved ones during the worst of the pandemic; and in some very tragic cases, not being able to say goodbye. In our Annual Report, you will read real stories which highlight the importance of the work CRJW does to keep families connected...always.

Our mission is simple: keeping children and families connected and helping them to continue building family relationships when a parent is incarcerated. To realize this mission during the pandemic, CRJW is working with families and California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) institutions to reimagine ways by which families can maintain constant connection. These efforts have led to pioneering programs including Stay Connected Projects, Video Messaging, and our first ever Get On The Bus Hub which CRJW will launch in the coming months. These new programs showcase our firm commitment to pursuing CRJW's mission wherever it leads so that we are able to provide critical family services to families across California.

In this year's annual report, we share stories of families staying connected during the pandemic, of CRJW's inspiring success in the LA2050 Grants Challenge, and of the importance of preparing for Get On The Bus when in-person visits resume. The foundation for CRJW's continuing success is community! We are grateful to have a community of caring and compassionate supporters who offer their time, energy, passion, and donations to further our mission and support our families. We are a grass-roots organization, powered by people like you. 
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Financial Stewardship

Family Express, supported by CDCR, provides free transportation and family reunification services to California families on a weekly basis. By offering safe and reliable transportation to visit a loved one in prison, Family Express offers the opportunity to restore and build those precious family relationships that mean so much to us all. Due to limited visiting and frequent shutdowns during the pandemic, Family Express has been dedicated to finding innovative ways to keep families connected with their loved ones on the inside.

Pamily express has helped me and my family in ways that are inexplicable. Their trips are amazing, and it makes us feel joyful and happy. It has opened opportunities for us as well. Instead of only going once a month to visit, I can go twice. Family express brings me and my family joy because it helps us see each other after being separated for a long time.

Get On The Bus


Get On The Bus (GOTB), our flagship transitional program, provides free transportation during Mother's Day and Father's Day for children to visit a parent at California state prisons.

Marcelina shares her family's experience with Get On The Bus

ur family like so many others has unfortunately experienced missing a loved one due to incarceration. Our family experienced this for so many years before we heard of Get On The Bus.

It had been roughly two years since our family last saw our loved one, and it was especially hard on the kids. Prior to COVID, GOTB was able to collaborate with the state prison our loved one was in and put together a weekend trip for us to visit. They not only set up a special visit and provided a charter bus for transportation, but they also provided food and a hotel room for us to stay in. And we also can't forget about the little goody bags GOTB put together with a special hand-written letter from our loved one. Without the help from Get On The Bus, I'm not sure when we would have been able to plan a trip. Holidays and birthdays always seem to be the hardest, especially for the kids.

My kids love their father so much, and although what the program offers cannot take the place of actually having their daddy home with them, it definitely helps boost their level of happiness knowing that there is a special program that cares,



and a daddy who is trying to stay connected even though he is so far away. Get On The Bus and all their staff make it possible for my family to continue to hold onto hope in this very unfortunate situation.

Camp Suzanne provides a rare opportunity for children to spend quality time with their mothers in prison. The week-long camp program, a combination of art and family support, offers a platform to nurture the critical relationship of mother and child.

During this week-long summer program, children spend mornings and afternoons with their mothers on prison grounds, engaging in fun activities like dancing, creating art, games, and having a movie night with mom.

Michael Pallares, Warden of the Central California Women's Facility (CCWF), describes how Camp Suzanne has impacted incarcerated mothers and staff at CCWF

COWF and prison staff see each other as human beings. CCWF staff are able to see incarcerated individuals as loving mothers with their children; and CCWF mothers are able to see the staff interact with their children. Before Camp Suzanne, women incarcerated at CCWF only saw the staff as officers and authorities at the institution, but Camp Suzanne humanizes the officers and lets inmates see them in a different light. The program breaks down barriers between inmates and staff at the institution, and it also facilitates the opening of communication channels.

For the mothers and their children, this is a very impactful program. California institutions generally do not allow incarcerated individuals to hold their children during a visit. At Camp Suzanne, children can cuddle with their mothers while they watch a movie, and reach out and embrace each other in ways that normally would not be possible. I've seen the positive impact this makes on families. We look forward to partnering with the Camp Suzanne program again after the pandemic.
